

First Reading:





## St. Ignatius of Antioch

Thank You for your generosity!

St. Ignatius of Antioch, a bishop of Antioch in the first century, was a direct disciple of the apostle John.

Throughout his ministry, he emphasized the importance of the real presence of Christ in

the bread and wine, considering the Eucharist as the "medicine of immortality" and "the flesh of our Savior Jesus Christ." His writings, particularly his seven epistles, passionately affirmed the significance of partaking in the Eucharistic celebration as a means to unite with Christ and fellow believers. He urged the faithful to hold fast to the teachings of the apostles and the sacraments passed down through the generations. St. Ignatius was martyred in Rome's Colosseum when he was thrown to the lions and devoured. He's remembered as the patron saint of Church unity, and the Eucharist. St. Ignatius of Antioch, pray for us!

## Mass at a Glance

## Part 13: Eucharistic Prayer IV –

The second portion of the Eucharistic Prayer (EP) takes two main purposes of remembrance and intercession. After the words of consecration are pronounced over the bread and wine so they transubstantiate into the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ, we are encouraged once again to call to mind the great things the Lord has done for us. This remembering is called anamnesis, a Greek word meaning, "a calling to mind." The General Instruction (GIRM) states this is that, "by which the Church, fulfilling the command that she received from Christ the Lord through the Apostles, celebrates the memorial of Christ, recalling especially his blessed Passion, glorious Resurrection, and Ascension into heaven." (GIRM 79e)


This is accomplished in two ways. The first is the memorial acclamation, by which the people express their acknowledgment of the mystery unfolding in front of them in one of three short statements. It is noteworthy that this acclamation is meant to be sung/recited by the people alone in response to the priest exclaiming, "The mystery of faith," as evidenced by the rubric instruction in the missal. The other is through the words of the EP immediately following the memorial acclamation. In every form of the EP, There is some explicit mention of events in the Paschal Mystery, i.e. Christ's Passion, Death, Resurrection, Ascension, and the second coming.

One other feature of the second half of the EP is some form of prayer for the communion of the Church. The GIRM relates, "The Church's intention, indeed, is that the faithful not only offer this unblemished sacrificial Victim but also learn to offer their very selves, and so day by day to be brought, through the mediation of Christ, into unity with God and with each other, so that God may at last be all in all." (GIRM 79f) It is a perfect reminder that Christ truly unites the members of the Church, and not any other human endeavor, and the Eucharist is the means by which Christ brings about this communion.

As this great prayer of sacrifice continues, the priest also calls to mind all those we are praying for. The Eucharist is offered for all the members of the Church, living and dead, and so prayers of intercession are inserted in the EP to bring all those in need of prayer to the altar. The typically intercessions are for the Church and her pastors, especially the Pope and the local Bishop of the diocese where the specific Mass is celebrated, for those gathered and those they are praying for, and for the dead. In this portion, we also ask the intercessions of Mary and the saints, reminding us of the Church triumphant in heaven praying for us.

Finally, the EP ends with the solemn doxology, which expresses the way in which the liturgical prayer of the Church is offered: through Christ, the Son, to God, the Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit. All the prayer of the Church is offered in a trinitarian way, for the "gory and honor" of God Almighty, and the people give their assent to the prayer by responding, "Amen."
